A NOTE FROM PASTOR HUGH

IS JESUS A SOCIALIST?

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, no matter what your politics:

ELECTION YEAR POLITICS seem filled with demagoguery that preys on our biases and on sound-bite slogans, personal attacks, and deceptions. It is hard not to be cynical and to lose sight of the tremendous blessings of freedom and opportunity we have in the U.S. But shame on us for accepting dishonesty as normal or acceptable, no matter who the source.



IT IS TEMPTING TO ASCRIBE ONE OR ANOTHER POLITICAL VIEWPOINT TO JESUS – BUT IT WOULD BE SIMPLY WRONG. You, as an individual Christian living in the new life and love of Jesus Christ, are encouraged to be an educated voter, but you should expect your church to be free from the politics of our nation and world. As your Pastor, I will not preach a specific political viewpoint and claim it to be based on God's Word, even though I may have personal preferences.

SO WAS JESUS A SOCIALIST? Certainly Jesus had a deep concern for the poor, the marginalized, those with disabilities. With the prophets of the Old Testament, he spoke against the arrogance and callousness of some of the religious leadership of his day, who not only condoned injustice but even profited from it and perpetrated it. He called his followers to be both generous and wise in their financial stewardship. He strongly warns about the materialistic mindset that creates anxiety and worry in individuals. Some would claim that our Lord affirms the notion of social responsibility and that living in his kingdom would demand sharing God's gifts with those in need. Unbridled profiteering and capitalism without Jesus is not moral – and the income inequalities we see in our nation, while market-driven, do not reflect our Father's sense of justice and compassion. Maybe Jesus would be a socialist.

BUT JESUS IS NOT ABOUT A GOVERNMENT SYSTEM that COERCES fulfilling an earthly plan of "sharing the wealth." The New Testament is clear – that the Kingdom that Jesus brings has its origins in the Father's love (fulfilled in his sacrifice at the cross) and not in being <u>forced</u> by the systems and powers of the world, no matter how well-intentioned! The Romans incorrectly saw Jesus as a threat to their empire. The Gospel writers used the language of "Lord" to show how God's ways and the ways of the world are not identical. In fact, they are often contradictory and no earthly governance (no matter which political party, dictatorship, or other system or scheme) will solve the inequities and poverty of our world ("The poor you will always have with you"). Power and human systems CANNOT create the Kingdom of God! At best, we can aim to reflect that Kingdom more fully.

IN ADDITION, TODAY'S "SOCIALISM" SEEMS TO DEMAND PROGRAMS AND FUNDS without also requiring personal responsibility or accountability – as if we have a <u>right</u> to prosperity, even if it is forced to come at the expense of the labors of others (usually with class division that feeds on envy and greed). Real need calls for Christians to step up for those in <u>real</u> need in ways that encourage responsibility, education and opportunity for ALL persons. It is a tall order that calls for the wisdom of God. Historically, individual freedom has brought the most prosperity to communities and nations and peoples. So maybe Jesus would <u>not</u> be a socialist.

I AM GRATEFUL FOR OUR PLACE IN A KINGDOM THAT TRANSCENDS all earthly systems. And I am grateful for the generous goodness of God. But I am most grateful to share God's mercy and grace and the promise of his eternal Kingdom. Let's share it again this Sunday in worship, fellowship, and study together.

We do not concede this understanding to those looking for some kind of "higher level" of Christian faith.

HOW'S YOUR GIVING?

The end of February is approaching and hopefully that the coldest part of the season is behind us. Lent is upon us and time to reflect on our relationship with our Savior, Jesus Christ. During this time, let us reflect on our commitment to our Church and its financial support. Our receipts to the General Fund during the month of

January were \$30,481 and the disbursements were \$42,018 for a deficit of \$11,537. January is not a good month as far as receipts are concerned and since half



of our insurance is payable at that time, it generates a larger deficit than most months. However, I am encouraged to find that our receipts this past January are \$5,000 greater than they were last year at this time. If our contributions continue to be \$5,000 greater each month then we will not have a deficit at the end of the year. This is very encouraging. Let's make sure that we continue on this trend.






[FELLOWSHIP HALL WITH PASTOR HUGH]


